Message from the Director

The new year has been filled with excitement for Kids Need to Read. We continue to grow at a rapid pace thanks to the wonderful support we are receiving from those who believe in our mission as strongly as we do. It has been a joy to give so many superb books to our recipients, knowing that they will be an inspiration to the children who read them. Whether it be assisting in giving over 3,000 books to the marvelous Friends of the New Orleans Public Library or giving smaller donations to schools in great need, the pleasure is always the same. In this newsletter, you will find stories and testimonials about some of the donations we have made in the past three months. Don't miss the kids' letters. Nothing could better illustrate the importance of books than the words of the children.

February was dedicated to raising funds for the Odessa Brown Children's Clinic. This clinic, awarded the UNESCO Confucius Prize for Literacy in 2006 for their work to reach low-income children most at risk for school failure, gives books to their young patients at their well child checks. For many of these children, the books are an exciting treasure -- their only source for receiving a book to call their own. Our fundraising drive resulted in \$1,700. We have ordered 320 new books for the Odessa Brown Children's Clinic to distribute and excitedly await their arrival. We thank all of you who enthusiastically supported our February auctions, as well as the Northern Virginia Browncoats and those who made generous personal donations for this drive.

Some of the Kids Need to Read volunteers had way too much fun working at the Phoenix Cactus Comicon in January. Hijinks did ensue! It was thrilling to meet some of the authors on the KNTR book list, as well as to give away books at our discussion panel. We had two fruitful fundraisers at the convention, thanks to the generosity of SpazDog Comics and the Dune Sea Garrison of the 501st Stormtroopers. Those funds will result in donations to struggling schools in Mesa and Tempe, Arizona Look for those stories in our next newsletter. You can read about our fun in this edition.

Our next event will be San Diego Comic-Con International in July, where we plan to spend some time volunteering in the Southern California Browncoats' booth. Please come see us there and support both the SoCal Browncoats and Kids Need to Read. We would love to meet and thank all of you.

New Orleans Donation Update

The Kids Need to Read 2007 year-end donation of books to the libraries of New Orleans took on behemoth proportions, growing from an impressive single pallet of high-end books to a stupendous four full pallets. The final gift was over 3,000 books valued at more than \$150,000! The books reached their final destination at the end of January. Katelyn Castleberry, the Executive Director of the Friends of the New Orleans Public Library, is overseeing the distribution of the books for the library system. "We were blown away," said Castleberry.

Assisting the libraries and schools of New Orleans in their recovery from Hurricane Katrina is a strong focus for Kids Need to Read. Eight of the thirteen public libraries of New Orleans were demolished in the disaster. Because all resources go toward rebuilding the destroyed libraries, funding for new books is non-existent beyond what the Friends of the New Orleans Public Library raise. Castleberry describes the hard-ships still hanging heavily over the Crescent City:

People think that time has erased the challenges that Katrina posed to the Gulf South. Time has helped us heal but every day is a challenge in this environment. We have to work harder than ever to maintain our schools, libraries and culture. We are at a pivotal time in history where every step affects the future. Your gift has infused us with bounty, kindness and most importantly something to share.

Kids Need to Read credits the generosity of Jade Corn of Phoenix Book Company and the influence of PJ Haarsma for the amazing donation made on behalf of the Kids Need to Read program. Kids Need to Read was tapped by Phoenix Book Company to facilitate the donation by finding an appropriate beneficiary for the types of books being donated, as well as acting as a liaison between all parties and coordinating the details of the donation. Phoenix Book Company absorbed the costly expense of shipping the books to New Orleans.

In describing Kids Need to Read, Katelyn Castleberry quoted a patron of the Friends of the New Orleans Public Library, "You sure do spread that reading around!"

New Books Delivered to Two Under-Funded Schools

Kids Need to Read used its January funds to make two large donations to school libraries in California and New Jersey. We were moved by the heartfelt submissions we received from these schools and hope to make a difference for their students.

Kristina Kim, a fifth grade teacher at Sutro Elementary School in San Francisco, California, told us of the lack of new reading material available to the students of Sutro:

My school library is very small and outdated. We don't have the budget to buy many books every year, but we make do with what parents donate. The kids in my school are voracious readers and love books of all kinds. I would love to see them with an up-to-date library, and perhaps some more of the classics, without the torn covers that have been loved to pieces.

Kids Need to Read sent the school 20 new books valued at \$300.00, giving their students fresh and exciting material to read. Kristina sent KNTR an enthusiastic thank you:

I just got the box on Wednesday! Thank you so much. The Librarian, Molly, is thrilled with the fact they are hardback books. They will surely last longer than any paperback we have in stock. The titles are amazing! And the kids in my class were ogling them on Thursday, asking to borrow them already! Thank you, thank you!

Nicole Sette, Media Specialist at New Brunswick High School in New Brunswick, New Jersey, sent Kids Need to Read a message expressing the especially dire situation of her library:

The Library at New Brunswick HS serves approximately 1200 students in grades 9-12. We have a 100% minority population, the majority being African American and Latino. Due to years of neglect there is no age appropriate YA fiction to reflect their lives and interests. We also have a large population of special needs students with no materials to reflect their reading levels.

New Brunswick High School was sent a total of 25 new books valued at \$400.00. Special care was given to meet the cultural and reading level needs requested in the submission letter. Nicole expressed her appreciation in a letter to Kids Need to Read when the books were on their way to her:

These are great! I'm so excited -- you are sending me some that were on my "wish list" for the library!

And after she received the books:

I am so happy to finally have some age-appropriate fiction for students to read -- I've already started processing them and getting them shelf ready. Thanks again!

The volunteers of Kids Need to Read are always excited when new donations are made, knowing that kids will find joy and inspiration in the exciting adventures found within the covers of their new books.

We received the book shipment last week. We were blown away.

We cannot really quantify how extremely helpful this shipment will be to both the Friends and the Library. Your donations were so top notch that we were able to fill gaps in the Library's collections across the city. We also have a large number of neighborhood centers, shelters and organizations that we were able to drop off books to. Often these places receive little if any donations of reading material and if they do, it is usually of a low quality. I have just returned from another successful book sale in some very ugly weather. I have another thanks to address to you and your organization. We have a small dollar amount that we simply must maintain as the end result of our sales. This dollar amount is the smallest amount of money that we can operate on. Today our volunteers were able to bring many more of your donations out to the sale. It was a rainy, windy, cold day. Usually no one even comes out to buy books in this weather, but we had many attendees due to the few selections of your books that they were able to see last week. (And I had been telling everyone about the books, as we were sorting them.) We passed our minimum sales quota on a day when we might not have been able to make half that if we did not have the buzz that these books created.

I wish you could see the shelves in the main library's acquisition department. They kept so many of your selections. They were beside themselves!

Our volunteer who helps the most with our community outreach programs came back today and took 2 more crates to shelters and community centers.

You have given us so much abundance that we have to share it with New Orleans and even further into Louisiana.

Kids Need to Read raises money to buy books for under-funded schools and libraries, as well as for organizations who give books to disadvantaged children. Funds are raised through various fundraising events and bi-weekly auctions, which have proven very popular among fans of *Firefly / Serenity* and science fiction, as well as literacy advocates. A <u>CafePress store</u> selling literacy-themed merchandise and "Kindness is a Strength" items helps raise additional funds for Kids Need to Read.
